

## Six-Month Report

I ran for Mayor because, after eight successful years as a Councillor, I still had more to give to my community. I am so grateful to the community for having entrusted me with its support. ### A Plan for Progress - in motion



Ever since my first run for City Council in 2014, I've been committed to bringing forward new ideas - ideas that are specific, actionable, and achievable for Sault Ste. Marie. Sometimes I've even been accused of having too many ideas. But changing the status quo doesn't happen on its own; it takes new approaches and new thinking and I see it as the role of Mayor and City Council to provide the direction to achieve that change. There is no real change without first having a real plan that is driven by real ideas and during the

2022 election, I presented 'A Plan for Progress'. Throughout my mayoralty, I'll provide updates on the progress we're making on the platform and below is a summary of the first six months.



A realistic approach to keeping property taxes in check



Proposed \$780,650 in cost savings during budget deliberations which helped lower the municipal portion of tax increase to 2.99%



Tax relief for those most in need




City Council approved tax relief for residents unable to pay because of sickness or extreme poverty

#### O Platform Commitment

Establishment of a supervised consumption site, lobbying the Provincial and Federal governments for more support



City Council supported a resolution asking city staff to review a process for the establishment of a supervised consumption site. Regularly meeting with City staff to determine the path forward, working with partners on an application and advocating for the support needed to fund it from other levels of government

Platform Commitment

More meetings and collaboration with peer governments, bringing Indigenous knowledge and teachings to City Hall



Met with Chiefs of Garden River First Nation and Batchewana First Nation shortly after inauguration,



visited the Indigenous Friendship Centre and worked with City staff to change the inaugural meeting of Council to include a welcoming led by Indigenous drumming. Create a fund for building demolition and property rehabilitation



City Council approved the creation of a property demolition fund with \$250,000 in funding and directed Affordable Housing Task Force to develop criteria

Improving traffic flow



City Council approved a resolution directing staff to review traffic signals and determine if there ways to that can improve traffic flow and any other outcome that will generally make the movement within the municipality easier
