SIX MONTH REPORT

Sault Ste. Marie is facing its fair (and in some cases, unfair) share of challenges. While our situation is not unique, what makes us unique is our impressive collective capacity to continue rising to meet the obstacles in front of us. Time after time, Saultites have proven to be resilient, often times when the deck is most stacked against us.

The Sault YMCA provides a foremost example of this resilience. The YMCA announced on April 16th it was ceasing operations by May 15th. This tight timeframe required the City, the Y and the private sector to work tirelessly, and often times around the clock, to come up with a solution. A community group was formed and facilitated gatherings to draw attention to the issue, while providing support for Y members distressed about an uncertain future. The City presented a plan at Council's meeting on April 29th and funding was approved at the next Council meeting on May 13th. During this meeting, a local YMCA representative said this was the only instance across the country in which community rallied so quickly to save a YMCA. Sault Ste. Marie should be proud of that. I certainly am. We can be proud of our community while acknowledging our challenges.



We're in the midst of a Canada and Ontario-wide physician shortage that is even more precarious in Sault Ste. Marie. The mental health and addictions epidemic is affecting communities across the world, and Northern Ontario is at the epicenter of the Canadian crisis. We're experiencing a rise in petty crime and vandalism, and too many Saultites don't feel the safety and security enjoyed by previous generations. An increasing number of young professionals look at the rising costs associated with buying a home with pessimism about their ability to become a homeowner themselves. Sault Ste. Marie's economic potential and future growth is jeopardized by demographics resulting from past decades of youth outmigration coupled with a declining birth rate and rising death rate.

I am fully aware of these challenges and work hard every day to drive solutions. The six month report concept is directly related to that – I wanted to find a way to let the community know what we're working on because I know it is easier to hear about our problems than it is to learn about what we're doing to address them. We can - and we will - fix the problems we face and unlock our promise.

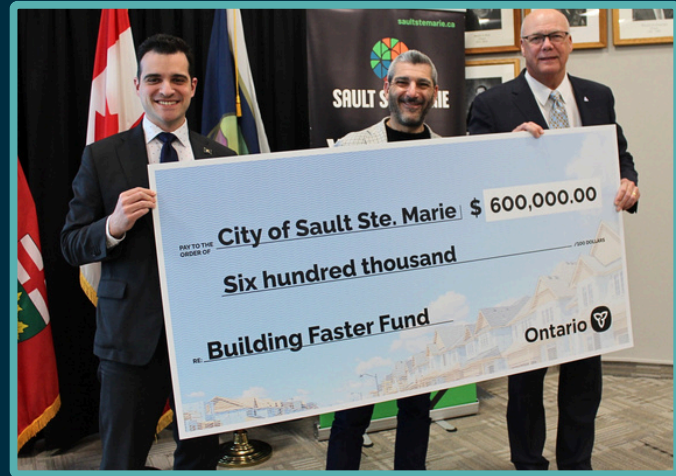

A PLAN FOR PROGRESS - IN MOTION

My 2022 Platform: **A Plan for Progress** offers a plan for Sault Ste. Marie rooted in community input, and throughout my mayoralty I will provide updates as we work to address our challenges.



○ PLATFORM COMMITMENT

Securing New Housing

✓ ACTION

We've made important progress to address the housing crisis. The City exceeded its provincially assigned housing target by nearly **200%** and we had another banner construction year with the value of building permits exceeding **\$148 million**. Council implemented 'as-of-right' permitting of multiplexes (provided set back criteria is met) in an effort to increase our housing stock – one of the most ambitious municipal planning changes in the country.

○ PLATFORM COMMITMENT

Lobbying the Provincial and Federal Governments for More Support

✓ ACTION

Aggressive advocacy resulted in important progress. The Federal Government announced its intention to make the Rural and Northern Immigration Pilot Program (RNIP) permanent and Sault Area Hospital received Provincial funding for a temporary return of the addictions-focused Day Treatment Program until the end of March. SAH has continued to offer the program since March as it pursues permanent provincial funding.



○ PLATFORM COMMITMENT

Keeping Sault Ste. Marie Affordable

✓ ACTION

Inflationary pressures and important issues such as health care and policing posed major fiscal challenges, but Council worked hard to reduce the proposed 7.2% tax increase to 4.8%. I proposed **\$777,352 in savings** during budget deliberations.

○ PLATFORM COMMITMENT

Adding to Our Cultural Vitality

✓ ACTION

The City held our community's first-ever public Menorah lighting in December to celebrate Hanukkah and the local Jewish community. On January 29th, 34 years to the day since the passage of what is commonly

referred to as the 'English-only' resolution, **City Council unanimously approved a resolution** that built upon the 2010 apology of Mayor Rowswell, and sought to ensure services are available to French-speaking residents in their language, at no cost to taxpayers.

○ PLATFORM COMMITMENT

Enhancing Our Quality of Life

✓ ACTION

Sault Ste. Marie's waterfront represents untapped potential, and we're looking to unlock it through the development of a new vision. We had almost 1,000 Saultites submit feedback already for the development of a Waterfront Design Plan to stitch together the great places along the water's edge and identify opportunities that **will transform the waterfront into a cohesive and vibrant place for all.**

○ PLATFORM COMMITMENT

Reconciliation and Relationship Building

✓ ACTION

The Mayor's Office has worked with our neighbours and community partners to facilitate Cultural Competency, Anti-Islamophobia and Antisemitism training opportunities for City staff. Recently, the Chiefs of Garden River First Nation and Batchewana First Nation attended at City Council to discuss the historic Robinson Huron Treaty Settlement distribution.

○ PLATFORM COMMITMENT

Continued Electrification of City Small Engines and Vehicles

✓ ACTION

Nearly \$8 million in Federal, Provincial and Municipal funding will support the purchase of two new electric buses and an electric charging station as well as maintenance equipment/service vehicles. City Council also agreed to purchase the City's third electric Zamboni, to be used at the John Rhodes Community Centre. Two electric Zambonis are already in use at the new Northern Community Centre twin-pad.



○ PLATFORM COMMITMENT

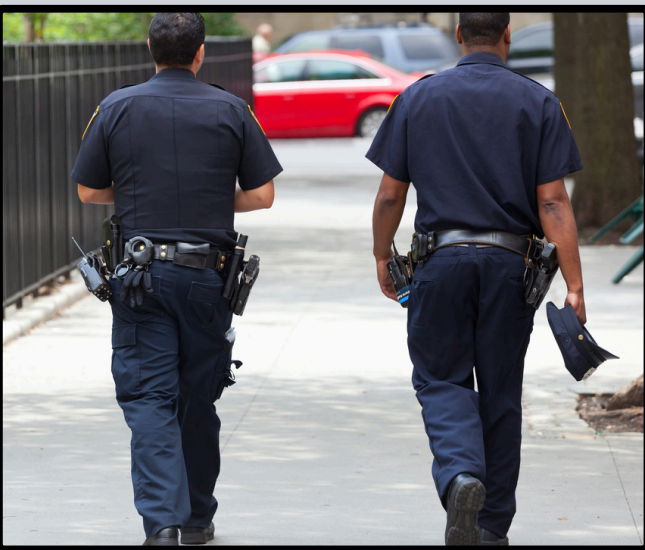
Taking Action against Negligent Landlords

✓ ACTION

The City is committed to doing everything it can to ensure irresponsible landlords are held accountable, and staff were able to recoup \$616,000 in unpaid taxes from a group of out-of-town landlords that own 201 rental units in Sault Ste. Marie.

○ PLATFORM COMMITMENT


Supporting Public Safety and Downtown Revitalization



✓ ACTION

Council approved a pilot program that will see downtown security foot patrols taking place on a daily basis, starting this summer. The goal of the pilot is to provide an additional level of safety and security in the downtown area, and to help prevent vandalism and crime. Expected patrol hours are 11 am-3 pm and 6 pm-10 pm, seven days per week. The downtown police station is also expected to open this summer.

Admittedly, I would never have thought the gesture would have meant so much to local Francophones given that 34 years have passed since the first faux pas.


But Shoemaker was correct.




The chopping has already started for budget deliberations. Shoemaker has proposed seven changes to the proposed 2024 budget that would result in \$567,325 in savings.

Mayor Shoemaker has been advocating for the return of the program since beginning his campaign for the mayor's seat at city council.




The days of free parking at the Civic Centre may be numbered. City staff have been instructed to prepare recommendations on whether municipal employees should pay to park there.


Mayor Shoemaker, who twice before has tried to persuade council to charge for parking, said he could support more than a dollar a day for city staff.
